GLOBAL Grants : Requirements

- Align with an area of focus
- Must be sponsored by a host club
- community and Rotarian participation
- Long-term, sustainable benefits
- Measurable results
- Budget of at least \$30,000 of which min 30% contribution by international partners.

PROJECT PLANNING





STEP 1: SET CLUB GOALS

- Define your club's goals
- Use those goals to identify service projects
- Respond to a need in the community
- Locate partners and projects

STEP 2: RESEARCH OTHER PROJECTS

- Visit Rotary Showcase to gather ideas
- Identify potential partner clubs
- Find other clubs with the same goals



STEP 3: IDENTIFY AND ASSESS COMMUNITY

- Identify the correct community/project
- Decide the host club's and international club's roles
- The host club conducts the community needs assessment
- **Long Term Sustainability**

STEP 4: IDENTIFY PARTNERS

- Use local organization and government partners
- Identify the strengths of all partners
- Define roles to ensure a successful project



Guatemalan Medical Resources Partnership

To provide free medical, eye, and dental care to 800-1,000 poor rural people in Oliveros, Guatemala.

In 2005, the Mequon-Thiensville Rotary Club started a medical mission in Oliveros Guatemala at a ranch owned by a member of the MWTM Rotary Club. The aim was to provide free medical, eye care and dental care to the poor rural population. Several members of the Madison West Towne-Middleton Rotary Club participated in the mission. The 4 day mission was a huge success treating hundreds of Guatemalans from the area, some walking for hours to get there. Since then, the mission has continued to provide these services every year in January to 800-1000 people. Each year, 40-45 Rotarians from various Rotary clubs and ancillary personnel continue to volunteer at the mission along with Guatemalan Rotarians and Guatemalan medical personnel. This project encompasses the cooperation of members of several Rotary clubs and has spun off other benefits such as the Oliveros Scholarship Project and the clean water well project.

STEP 5: MEASUREMENT AND EVALUATION

- Put a plan in place before implementation
- Keep measurements simple
- Establish baseline data
- Determine quantitative and qualitative measures





GRANT APPLICATION PROCESS

1. Clubs must qualify.
 2. Clubs complete the district applications
 3. District authorizes application
 4. Host Club Submits GG application
1. Rotary Foundation reviews for approval
 2. Sponsor/Partner is notified of grant status



GLOBAL GRANT REPORTING

- Report progress within 12 months after funds are received
- Report every 12 months until project is complete
- Submit final report within two months of project completion

DISTRICT 7510 GUIDELINES

1. District 7510 application form available on line.
2. Initial Project consultation and guidance available .
3. District may match upto 100% of clubs contribution.
4. District encourages several clubs joining together to support one project
