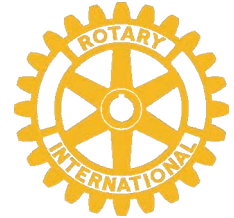

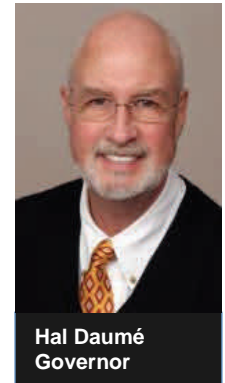

Several officers of the Summit-New Providence club, including Reagan Burkholder, Joe Steiner, Vito Gallo and Jim Fleischmann, recently met with the Summit High School's new Interact Club. This was the Club's first meeting of the new school year.

President Reagan began the meeting by presenting the Club's charter as an Interact Club to Interact President Sarah Elia. Previously the Club had been affiliated with the local Kiwanis Club and was chartered as a Key Club.

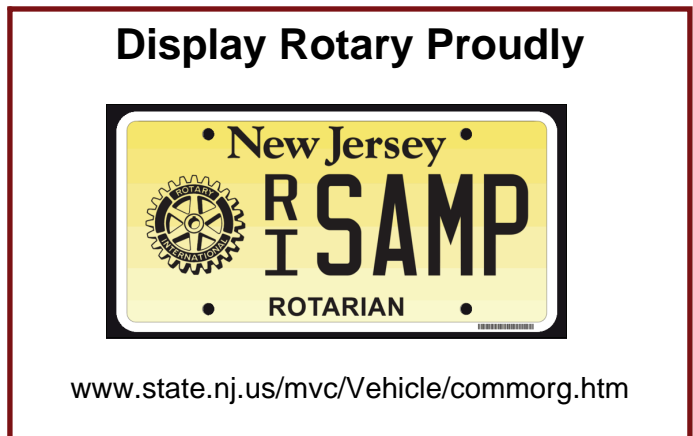
Regardless of whether your club has a successful membership plan, I need your support in this new plan of action.

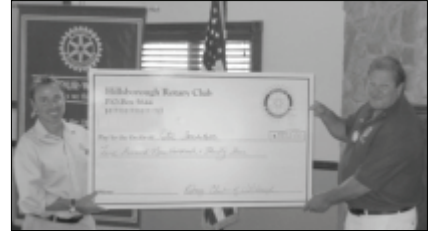

No Wild Polio in Africa!!

What can we say other than "Wow!?" Let's all say "thank you" to the thousands and thousands of people who have supported our efforts to eliminate the scourge of polio from the earth. With no wild polio reported in Africa, we must focus our attention on Afghanistan and Pakistan. But attention alone will not get the job done.



Our district-wide goal for 2015-2016 is again \$20,000. But that amount when sent to RI is automatically increased by the matching grant that the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation has offered Rotary.

RI recently sent out letters encouraging Rotarians to donate \$30 to mark the 30th anniversary of PolioPlus. That \$30 (or whatever amount you donate) will be matched twice by the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation, making your \$30 become \$90. Our \$20,000 goal will become \$60,000!

The importance of continuing our mission is reflected in the following story submitted by Gail Barlow of the Branchburg Club.

Have you ever asked yourselves why polio eradication is such an important role especially for the Rotary clubs and the Rotary Foundation? This story might give you a feel for it!

Polio is an awful disease which most of us are not familiar with. The young generation both in the USA and in Europe did not suffer from it and is not familiar with its devastating effects.

A few years before I was born in Israel the disease had a terrifying presence in my country. My oldest sister's best friend, Rachel, who happened to be one of the best students in the class, woke up one morning and could not get out of bed. She could not move her feet nor her legs. She woke up totally paralyzed and never recovered from it!

When Rachel did not get out of bed in the morning to help her Mom set the table for breakfast, her Mom rushed to her room and called for her to get up, but she couldn't move. Her parents started yelling at her and tried pulling her off the bed. They were certain that Rachel is making it all up and refused to believe that anything was really wrong.

The more they yelled and screamed, the more devastated little Rachel felt. She did not understand what was going on. The fear, the pain and the devastation of this weird situation did not sit well with a young girl who was a leader. After a couple of minutes of pushing and pulling, both parents realized that something must be wrong. They sent for the doctor and my grandma, who was a nurse, came rushing over. After checking Rachel's vital signs and seeing her lack of energy and inability to move, my grandma suspected that Rachel might have caught Polio. The doctor arrived a little later and confirmed my grandmother's suspicion.

Rachel was sent to the hospital where she was given braces and a wheel chair and crutches. She had to be taught how to start walking with the help of the crutches, but never re-gained her ability to walk. In fact, she didn't continue to grow normally. For the rest of her life, she was small and immature; her physical growth seemed to have stopped when she caught Polio.

My sister stayed friendly with Rachel for a while but then their lives turned in different directions. I understand that Rachel did get married and was able to get pregnant, with the help of modern medicine.

Years later I met her and she was still walking with braces; she did not regain the use of her legs. The devastating effect of this disease has ruined her life and the lives of many other children.

Rachel is only one example , but we saw it before our eyes, day and night, when we were young. Polio has taken the lives of millions of people, young and old, all over the world. When you meet victims and survivors of Polio, you realize the importance of Rotary's mission to stop Polio from existing in our world.

Healing the Children

Healing the Children New Jersey is a non –profit organization that was founded in 1981. We are dedicated to the mission of providing access to medical care to children–in–need in New Jersey and around the world. We have successfully partnered with Rotary clubs and districts, including providing medical services at the Homes of Hope Village in Ecuador.



HTCNJ has asked the Branchburg club for help again this winter with a medical mission to Guayaquil. The club has agreed to the request, as long as a club in Ecuador is willing to partner for a matching grant. Doug Merritt, Branchburg's Homes of Hope master, plans to meet the the president of the Ecuador club, who also happens to be a doctor at the hospital where HTCNJ will be working, while he is in Ecuador in 3 weeks.

HTCNJ's administrative expenses are low because professionals, who are dedicated to our cause and volunteer their time, do so much of what we do. We have a small staff (one full time and one half time) and hundreds of volunteers.

There are those who actively support our efforts by helping us raise awareness and funds for our mission; others who open up their homes to children from other countries who have come here to receive care that cannot be found in their homeland. Still others – nurses, physicians and assorted professionals - who donate their personal time and money to participate in international missions, bringing medical care to children who otherwise go without.

The care we provide to New Jersey's children caters to those in need who have exhausted all other resources. We would like the opportunity to address Rotary clubs in District 7510 and share our mission. We can also send along a packet which gives an overview of our programs.
