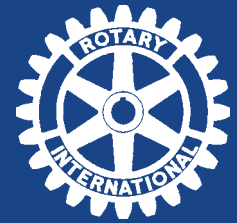

Time to prepare and submit your applications for District Grants. This year, each qualifying club is guaranteed \$500 for a valid grant and could earn up to \$1,500. What's the catch? Your club must have an executed *Memorandum of Understanding* and must file your grant application on-line using the NEW Grants Module in the District and Club database (DaCdb).

Thanks to the folks at DaCdb, we have a step-by-step guideline that your club's foundation chair or other representative can follow to file the application. District Foundation Committee representatives will review and approve using the same Module. Less paperwork all around and a quick review and turnaround for your check to be sent out!

The Rotary Club of Old Bridge-Sayreville held presented their largest scholarship award amount to a record number of students at Middlesex County College this year. Thirty recipients enjoyed awards totaling \$66,000 at the annual Scholarship Reception at MCC last fall. The event allows scholarship donors to mingle with the students that they assisted. Rotarians Joseph Juliano and Suzanne Meyer, center, are pictured with the club's recipients.

"It really is a wonderful night," said Veronica Clinton, director of development and alumni relations and executive director of the College Foundation. "It gives our donors the chance to get to know the students they are helping."

The Club has a long history of helping MCC students. Since 1991, 195 students have received 267 scholarships (many have received renewed scholarships), for a total of \$358,134.



The Rotary Club of Hamilton held its fourth annual *Soup 4 You* contest at Steinert High School highlighting delicious soups from local restaurants. The overall Grand Champion was Killarney's Publick House with their Cream of Chicken and Rice soup. More than 250 attendees sampled specialty soups and were treated to rolls, breads and cookies provided by Mercer County Culinary Arts students.

All winners and honorable mentions were only points apart. Pictured in front are Anthony Nieves, Head Chef - Killarney's Pub and staff member Natalie Bowden, along with club members Frank Mancino, Marie Varga, Indy Liepins, President Ty Robinson.

The Interact Club of Union High School, sponsored by the Union Rotary Club, recently made a significant donation to ShelterBox USA. ShelterBox is an international disaster relief charity which provides humanitarian aid worldwide in the form of shelter, warmth and dignity for people displaced by natural and other disasters.

The club set a goal of \$1000 for fundraising efforts in order to pay for a Shelterbox and through teamwork met that goal. Each ShelterBox contains a 10 person tent, blankets, water purification and cooking equipment, basic tools, a stove and other essential equipment.

Members of the club were moved to raise money through candy, bake, and snack sales to raise the

funds for this important donation when they learned that typical aid after disasters comes in the form of food and medicine but little assistance is given in terms of proper shelter as survivors try to rebuild their lives. All Shelterboxes are numbered so they can be tracked by donors.

The Rotary Club of Plainsboro-North & South Brunswick and Interact Club of South & North Brunswick High School volunteered in early March for MedShare, a nonprofit organization dedicated to improving healthcare and the environment through the efficient recovery and redistribution of the surplus of medical supplies and equipment to those most in need.

The organization collects surplus medical supplies and equipment from hospitals, distributors and manufacturers, and then redistributes it to qualified healthcare facilities in the developing world. The two clubs sorted through 1,000+ pounds of medical supplies and created 100+ boxes that will end up on shipments to hospitals and clinics all over the world. .



The Rotary Club of Dunellen-Greenbrook will feed your face with a delicious, all-you-can-eat spaghetti dinner every Monday night in April. This popular fundraiser is offered at Zupko's Cafe on Route 28 in Dunellen, from 5:30 p.m. to 7:30 p.m. There will also be a Super 50/50 at \$5 per ticket. Adults tickets are \$10, children 4 to 12 are \$5, and under 4 eat free. Proceeds will benefit the club's Scholarship Fund for Dunellen and Green Brook high schools.

Event organizer Richard Nabasny coordinates the event for the club on a quarterly basis. Note the proper safety attire and signage.

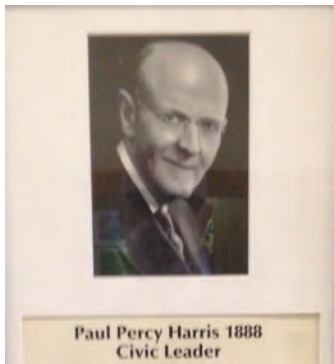

In the Footsteps of the Founder Hal Daumé

Saxtons River, Vermont is home to the famous Vermont Academy. Founded in 1876, this co-educational high school embraced—unique for its time—a broad curriculum that challenged students to think for themselves and make responsible choices. It certainly made a difference for many of its graduates, among them the young man in the picture at right.



In early March, Linda and I journeyed to Saxtons River and the Vermont Academy as RLI (Rotary Leadership Institute) faculty facilitators, where we met over two dozen enthusiastic Rotarians from Vermont plus northern Massachusetts, lower Maine, and New Hampshire. The day was filled with lively discussions and creative insights as we proceeded through a variety of topics both leadership- and Rotary-related.



During one of the breaks I wandered the halls of the building we occupied for the day and along the way discovered a photo on the wall between classrooms.

Yes, that young man in the first photo was Paul Harris, Vermont Academy graduate and Founder of Rotary International in 1905.

One hundred eleven years ago he was Rotary's very first "Gift to the World."

The Rotary Club of Branchburg welcomed French Exchange student, 17 year old Anne Coulondre, into their fold.

When asked about her experiences Ann said, " I wished to live a in a foreign country for a year, first by seeing my brother live his adventure by spending one year in Wisconsin. Also we were host family for a girl from Taiwan, one from San Francisco in America and a young man from Argentina. Seeing how they enjoyed their experience, I asked myself: Why not me? And here we go, I'm here!"

"I really wanted discover a new culture, a new way of life, meet new people and leave my comfort zone!" said Anne. She was excited by the possibility of speaking English because she hopes to travel around the world, and finds English is indispensable to communicate with others.



This year Anne attend Somerville high school. She participated in cross country, fencing, track, and the French Club. As a member of the Interact club she helped with nursing home events and movie night.

Anne is an active member of the Rotary Club of Branchburg, attending meetings every Wednesday morning at 7:30 which is no easy task for an "American" teenager. She has helped the Rotary Club by making blankets for children with cancer, raising money during the holiday time, cooking for the food bank.

She has enjoyed sharing stories with other exchange students from around the world about her experiences. Her favorite sites to visit have been New York City, Georgetown in Washington DC and the United Nations. "I'm so happy to be able to live this wonderful adventure, even it's not always easy to

be far from my family and my friends and to be in a country where I don't always understand what's going on," said Anne. "I am I'm so thankful to my parents, to the Rotary club of Branchburg, to my counselor Victoria Maloney, the Browns, my host family and everybody who I have met, who have welcomed me and allowed me to share a part of their lives. This year has permitted me to grow up and see the world in many different ways. Now my desire to travel has increased tenfold."



In France, Anne lives in a small city called Brive-la-Gaillarde, four hours from Paris. Next year Ann will be a senior at her high school in France where she will study

science and participate in track and field. She has three siblings, a twin, Elisabeth and 20 year old twins Claire and Martin. Her mother is a librarian in a high school and her father is a history and geography teacher in a middle school. He is also volunteers as a track coach.

World Peace Conference - Part 3DG Hal Daumé

Just when you think you've seen everything—Sharon Stone, Truckers Against Trafficking, a Priest turned savior of hundreds of street kids otherwise on their way to a life in and out of prisons, and dozens more—along comes Bazzel Baz.

Is that really a name? Yup. But he just goes by “Baz,” and if you're into the new TV show, “Black List,” starring James Spader and Megan Boone, then you've already met “Baz”—because that's his character's name, too!

Baz is one of only twelve current and former U.S. intelligence officers known as “Life Guarantors.” “If you get shot, I can do the surgery, and then I can get you out, because I'm a pilot, too.” He can also drive a semi, captain a boat, hotwire a car, apply CPR—whatever needs be done to get the person under his protection out of any situation—in one piece.



He's a former USMC Captain and sixth-generation military man, former CIA special ops officer, devout Christian, and—*get this*—a finder of stolen children. Baz is the founder and “first among equals” of ARC—the Association for the Recovery of Children. The ARC is his hand-picked group of former military servicemen with very special skill sets. For the past dozen years, their mission has been finding and bringing back kidnapped children. To date, 60 children—a 100% success record—have been brought home and were able to thank Baz and his team personally for finding them somewhere overseas and saving them from lives of human slavery or worse.

The ARC and its missions are funded either by the team themselves or by direct donations. There are no “employees” and there's no government funding. As Baz puts it, “We do want the CIA can't and the FBI isn't allowed to do.”

For both Linda and me, attending this first-of-its kind Rotary Peace Conference has left an indelible imprint in our minds and hearts. Baz is one of the hundreds of men and women around the world, from Rotary and beyond, who have made that happen.
