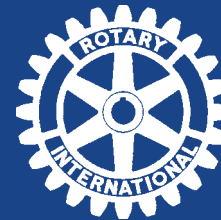

Governor's Message - Rotarians are Innovators and Achievers!

Open your June *Rotarian* magazine to page 22 and then "WOOF IT UP" at the Flemington Club's June 12 *Bark in the Park* event write-up! Congratulations to our Flemington Rotarians for getting this event such a *primo* listing for all to see!

At our recent District Conference, we took the time to recognize the innovators and achievers in our District. You've heard of these awards before –*Rotarian of the Year, Governor's Cup, Paul Harris Fellow Recognition, Best Websites and Newsletters* and *Public Image*...there are too many to list in this intro, but all of them are announced in the article that follows.

At our recent District Conference, we honored our Top Club in the district this year—Hamilton Township—with the Governor's Award for 2015-16. Overall, six clubs in our district earned the Presidential Citation-Gold Level: Berkeley Heights, Fanwood-Scotch Plains, Hamilton Township, Hillsborough, Plainsboro-North & South Brunswick, and Summit-New Providence. Two clubs earned the Presidential Citation-Bronze Level: Old Bridge-Sayreville and Plainfield-North Plainfield.

Seven clubs received special Membership Development awards: Hamilton Township (net 8 new members), Plainsboro-North & South Brunswick (8), Fanwood-Scotch Plains (5), Plainfield-North Plainfield (5), Summit-New Providence (4), Clinton Sunrise (3), and Somerville-Bridgewater (3).

Fourteen clubs received Care & Share awards; the top five awards went to Fanwood-Scotch Plains, Hamilton, Hillsborough (2), and New Brunswick.

Three clubs (Hamilton, Union, and North Hunterdon) earned Club Newsletter awards, four (Hamilton, Hillsborough, and Plainsboro-N&S Brunswick and Summit-New Providence) received Club Website awards, and three (Hillsborough, North Hunterdon, and Roselle-Roselle Park) earned Club Public Image awards.

Byron Miller of Westfield was honored with the Rotary International Citation for Meritorious Service, Corrine Fender of Hillsborough received the Rotary International Spouse/Partner Award, and John Lutz of the Hamilton Club received the "Matty Mathewson" Rotarian of the Year Award.

And Berkeley Heights and Edison celebrated their 50th Anniversaries!

The Rotaractors of Kean and Rutgers told us of their clubs and community service, and our three international exchange students—Marianna Braga, Anne Coulondre, and Saeko Kurayamad—shared their year-long experiences with us, thanks to their mentor, Jim Murray of the North Hunterdon Club.

An International Project is Underway

The Rotary Club of New Brunswick is very pleased to announce the successful implementation of an International Service Project in Delhi, India.



In 2014, our club partnered with the host club of Delhi Uptown (India) to apply for a global grant to supply three diagnostic/testing machines to a children's health clinic. The Global Grant has three main objectives

1. Early diagnosis and intervention in early childhood illnesses and developmental deficits caused by maternal, fetal and neonatal factors.
 2. Critical care for pre term babies
 3. Early intervention in cases of hearing and speech impairment and language development disorders.
- The Clinic provides diagnosis and treatment at no cost to the families who cannot afford to pay.

The total budget for this project was \$55000, of which The Rotary Foundation gave a Global Grant of \$23000. The balance was contributed equally by the hosts (the Delhi club and their District) and the International Partners (our club and District 7510).

The project was inaugurated in February 2015. We have just submitted our report to the Foundation on the impact of this project on the local community for the first full year.



With the help of the three machines and the training support organized thru the clinic by the local Rotary Club and the partner hospital, this project is now helping 160 children every three months. In addition, eleven maternal and child health specialists have been trained during the last year and 600 mothers are receiving prenatal care every three months! This will have a major impact on reducing the number of children born with birth defects.

International Service (cont'd)

The Rotary Club of Delhi Uptown is regularly monitoring the impact and success of the project. We are now jointly reviewing with them how can we further expand the scope of this project to reach other nearby communities.

Our Club is very proud to be a part of this Project. We thank all other clubs in District 7510 who contributed to the project and participated in our fundraising activities. For us, this was the first Global Grant Project and we learned a great deal about the process while, at same time, making friends with Rotarians across the globe. This has encouraged us to take on other International Projects – one in Cape Town, South Africa (Global Grant already received and the project is under implementation) and another one in Ecuador (currently under progress).

Checklist for Presidents–Elect

1. Set up your club's calendar for the coming year. Include all club projects, ceremonies, fundraisers, and district events, such as the *Eat, Drink and Share* fundraiser on Monday, November 14, 2016.
2. Appoint all club officers including the Foundation Chair. Go to DACdb and register the chairs.
3. Make sure to connect your club in DACdb to rotary.org and vice versa (ask District Secretary Michael Townley for help - secretary7510@rotarynj.org).
4. Have your Treasurer add \$100 to the annual billing as an Optional Tax Deductible Donation to The Rotary Foundation.
5. Ask Byron Miller to come to your club quarterly to give an inspiring program on *The Rotary Foundation*. He also gives a great program on water. Byron@portasoftinc.com

Rotary Foundation District Grants

The Rotary Foundation returns money to our District every year that the District then makes available in the form of grants for club projects. This should be “old news” to our clubs. However, what is “new news” is that the guaranteed minimum is \$500 per club for a qualifying project or projects, and the maximum is \$1,500. Also, for the next grant cycle, clubs will fill out their grant applications on-line in DaCdb, the District and Club database.

The District is using a new “Grants Module” to help streamline the process of submitting, approving, and awarding grants for the 2016-2017 year.

We are guaranteeing that every club will receive a minimum of \$500 for a qualifying project. That is

the minimum, and the maximum that may be awarded is \$1,500! But the even better news is that you can partner with another club or clubs and pool your resources and your grant awards to accomplish even bigger projects. One club will complete the grant application on-line, and will identify the partner clubs in that application. If you want to partner with another lead club, simply make the commitment to that lead club and they will do the rest.

At PETS 1, our Foundation Grants Subcommittee presented information on grant availability and answered questions from presidents-elect. The subcommittee also handed out the paperwork necessary for clubs to qualify for receiving grants.

The next phase of the project is for clubs to decide on their grant-eligible projects and submit their applications on-line at DaCdb – www.directory-online.com/Rotary.

Our friends at DaCdb have made a handy overview/guide available – you can download it [here](#).

After reviewing the guide, you can gather your information and then proceed to the Grants Module and follow the steps to submit your grants.

We have District representatives ready to review your applications and assist as needed in filing the correct information.

Don't wait! File your applications as soon as possible, but no later than July 15, 2016.

Global Grant Opportunity in Ecuador

At a recent joint meeting of The Rotary Clubs of Roselle - Roselle Park and the Rotary Club of Cranford, members of both clubs listened to a presentation by fellow Rotarian Sharan Jain of the New Brunswick Club about a humanitarian effort in Ecuador sponsored by Rotary.

Sharan Jain, a member of the Rotary Club of New Brunswick, is spearheading a Rotary initiative in District 7510 (39 clubs and 1050 members) - a Rotary International Global Grant. The goal of this Grant is to build toilet facilities for 70 people in Quilanga City in the Province of Loja, Ecuador.



Currently, these people satisfy their biological needs outdoors which is contaminating the land, water and environment causing the proliferation of many diseases such as cholera, typhoid, diarrhea and various other infectious diseases. Therefore, the success of this project will have a widespread beneficial effect on the health of the inhabitants and their environment.

The total cost of the project is \$38,500. A cooperative effort of Rotarians in the United States and Ecuador, the following Rotary entities will share the cost: Rotary and Rotaract Club of Loja, Ecuador (a Rotaract Club is a Rotary service, leadership and community service organization for young men and women between the ages 18–30); Rotary Club of New Brunswick; the Rotaract Club of Rutgers University, New Brunswick; Rotary District 7510; Ecuador Rotary District which includes Laja Province and Quilanga City; Rotary International (which will provide matching funds for funds from districts and clubs); and other Rotary Clubs in Rotary District 7510 who are now considering participation in the project, including the Rotary Club of Roselle-Roselle Park and the Rotary Club of Cranford.
